SEPTEMBER 13, 2001

I COULDN'T STAND being in front of the television anymore. I was watching what was going on just a few miles to the south, and it seemed that I was protecting myself from the terror in my own city. It seemed that I should at least try to get closer to this terrible scene where so many New Yorkers had died. I got my bicycle, and at around 7pm took off south on the long pathway that runs adjacent to the Hudson River on the west side of Manhattan. It is a beautiful pathway, used by joggers and bicyclists, and you can practically touch the river. You feel the smell of water, a breeze, and there are no buildings, just boats and water. The sun was just setting, and it was a beautiful sunset, fiery orange on a lovely evening. I thought of how those killed would never see a sunset again. Then all sorts of never-again scenarios taxed my mind.

Richard Goodman is the author of French Dirt: The Story of a Garden in the South of France. The San Francisco Chronicle called it "one of the most charming, perceptive and subtle books ever written about the French by an American." He is also the author of A New York Memoir and The Soul of Creative Writing. He has written for a wide variety of publications, including the New York Times, Harvard Review, Creative Nonfiction, Commonweal, Vanity Fair, The Writer's Chronicle, Saveur, Ascent, French Review, and the Michigan Quarterly Review.

Gaylord Schanilec has produced many finely printed books, including *New York Revisited* for the Grolier Club of New York in 2002, who proclaimed him to be "the foremost contemporary artist in colored wood engraving, justly renowned for the power of his images." His work is represented in most major collections of contemporary book arts in the United Sates and the United Kingdom, including the Getty Museum, the Victoria and Albert Museum, and the University of Minnesota, which is also the repository of his archives.
